Curriculum Changes 2019

The new curriculum in Wales

The world is watching while Wales develops its new, innovative curriculum which aims to ensure that all children have a rich and fulfilling educational experience from age 3 to 16 ... and St Joseph's RC High School is at the centre of this exciting change.

When does the new curriculum start?

From September 2022, school children across Wales will experience a completely new curriculum. This means that children who are currently in Year 3 will be the first recipients of the new curriculum when they begin Year 7.

My children are already in high school so this doesn't concern me – does it?

Yes, it does. St Joseph's RC High School is a pioneer school which means that our whole school community has a voice in the construction of the new curriculum. We are helping to shape the future of education in Wales.

What does this new curriculum look like?

This curriculum will look very different from anything we have seen in Wales before.

Four Purposes

This curriculum is driven by Four Purposes which describe what sort of young people we want our schools to foster and nurture:

Ambitious, capable learners who are ready to learn throughout their lives.


Enterprising, creative contributors who are ready to play a full part in life and work.

Ethical and informed citizens who are ready to be citizens of Wales and the world.

Healthy, confident individuals who are ready to lead fulfilling lives as valued members of society.

Six Areas of Learning and Experience:

- Language, Literacy and Communication
- Maths/Numeracy
- Health and Wellbeing
- Humanities
- Science and Technology
- Humanities



What else is important in the new curriculum?

Running alongside the AoLEs are the cross-curricular responsibilities of literacy, numeracy and digital competence. Digital competence aims to prepare young people for the challenges they may face in the future with the ever-increasing speed of technological advancements. Learning about Wales and its place in the world, along with a range of wider skills complements our new curriculum.

What are we doing at SJHS?

This year, we are trialling the new Humanities curriculum. Teachers in Religious Education, History, Geography, Business and Welsh Baccalaureate are trialling the new draft curriculum, researching the latest ideas in teaching and testing out some of this research with their classes. We are working with University of Wales Trinity St David who are supporting us as we develop our own school approach to classroom based research.

Our partner primary schools are working with us, trialling the Humanities curriculum to ensure that there is a fluid progression of learning throughout a child's learning journey.

Where do we parents/carers/families fit in?

At the end of April, the whole curriculum will be published as a draft for people to have a look and give their viewpoints so have a look and get involved.

We will be updating you regularly on developments with the new curriculum and if you have any questions or comments, please let us know at the school and we will be happy to publish answers to your questions right here.

Metropolitan Museum



DRAMA IN NEW YORK



Easter Message Finding Our True Identity in Christ


As we approach the Easter season, it is important that we consider our identity. Searching for our identity is part of life. We identify our "self" as a family member, spouse, sibling, teacher, student, farmer, statistician, or clerk - the list goes on. We also identify ourselves as Catholic, or as members of a parish. Identity involves discovering who we are as persons and what our role is by answering these questions: who am I, and why am I here? Growth in the awareness of our Christian identity is a lifelong process that shifts as we change. It is rooted in Baptism, where we are transformed into our true identity as sons and daughters of the Father. St. Paul's Letter to the Ephesians, quoted above, challenges us to put away our former life and put on a new self. In other words, he tells us to turn from sinful ways and take on our new life in Christ. In so doing, we become one with Christ, where we find our true identity. We accept this challenge during the Easter, as we journey with Christ through life's difficulties to eternal life.

For many people, Easter is just another holiday, a 3-day weekend of fun and sun. Or doing something. For others, it's bunny rabbits and hunting Easter eggs with no other meaning than these. For others, it's just another so-called ghost story, which they do not believe. But we know better!

For believers in Christ, Easter means the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead! It means the promise of life after death because Jesus conquered the grave! It means hope of a better life. It means joy, not sorrow.

No event has had a greater impact on the history of mankind than the resurrection of Jesus Christ. We know the Bible speaks of this event, but sometimes we need to know just how vital it is to our faith. The historical fact of Christ's resurrection is the lynchpin of the gospel. The Resurrection is not something to remember each year but every week.

A day in the life of a Sixth Former is something of a change to KS4 life. There are similarities – registration, lessons and break times all have the same timetable. However, as you will now only be studying a handful of subjects, the frequency of each subject lesson will increase.

One of the main differences is the fact that you will have free periods throughout the day which can be used as you wish, and you have the common room and study area where you can meet with friends or complete work. It's about increased independence with added responsibility, which is essentially training us for the next steps in our lives.



Science IN HEALTH

Sixth Form Experiences







In March, the Biology department took 31 Year 12 and 13 science students to the Science in Health event, held annually by Cardiff Medical School at the Heath campus.

Students from all over Wales attend over the two days. The aim of the event is to raise awareness of all of the sciences that support Medicine as well as the range of medical based courses available.

The day is divided into a series of lectures, engaging practical tasks and displays of cutting edge surgical equipment, tours of the research laboratories and competitions.

The first lecture not only provided the latest findings into the causes of cancer, but also the technologies being used and developed in order to provide earlier diagnosis and produce individual treatment plans. The role of Artificial Intelligence in analysing medical tests and scans was discussed. One doctor spoke of her experiences as a rural GP. Another informed us of the research into the causes of sepsis and finally, there was a lecture on the use of the complement system to potentially treat Alzheimers. A group of medical students and pHD students held a question and answer session which was extremely informative.

Our students enjoyed the 'interactive arm' where current medical students taught them how to take blood and engaged in the DNA exercise run by the Welcome Foundation and Gene Park Wales. Our students fully participated in the four competitions that ran throughout the day, with three wins for St Joseph's!

This was the 25th year of this event and once again it delivered an informative, interesting and engaging day which our students thoroughly enjoyed and made the most of. Needless to say, our sixth form were a credit to the school.

Experiences from Auschwitz:

Going to Auschwitz is an unforgettable experience. All of us are aware of the six million people who perished in the Holocaust but it is through hearing their stories and glancing into the cruelties they had to endure that history becomes animated beyond the familiar facts and figures. With this comes the stark realisation that those in Auschwitz were not any different to you and me.


Auschwitz was not what I expected; upon arrival I expected to see the infamous train tracks and imposing building that comes to mind when we think of the camp. However, I didn't realise Auschwitz was not a single camp but composed of three camps, two of which still stand today. The first camp we visited was Auschwitz One, a collection of small brick buildings and if it were not for the high barbed fences you would not surmise you were at a concentration camp. Venturing into the buildings and hearing people's stories emphasised the barbarity they were subjected to. The mass operation that was Auschwitz is emphasised by the size of the second camp - Birkenau.

Despite the size of Birkenau, a deeper impression was made by the rooms with wall to wall displays brimming with possessions: clothes, shoes and even human hair! From the amount, you would think the items were collected in the four and a half years the camp operated, but it was merely six weeks' worth, solely collected from the smallest camp, Auschwitz One. Horrifying. Yet, these objects do not solely reflect the mass genocide but the debasement and depravity of the actions committed. For me this was hard hitting. To be stripped of your clothes, your shoes and even your hair is an unfathomable injustice. Our visit did not solely focus upon the victims of Auschwitz but the perpetrators also. In my mind, I had considered them to be deprived of humanity but seeing the photos of staff days out in the nearby town, hearing about the supervisor, and his family who lived in Auschwitz, playing with his children surprised me the most. It was an important lesson as those involved were ordinary people blinded by racial prejudice. The persecution of the Jews evolved as Auschwitz itself evolved.

First, Auschwitz was a barracks, then a labour camp and lastly a death camp. For the Jews, what began as small acts of injustices spiralled onwards until the holocaust was the outcome. It is easy to think of Nazis as removed from everyone else but they were ordinary people with families they adored and hobbies they enjoyed just like we all do. It was a stark realisation I had during this trip; ordinary people are capable of atrocities if hatred goes unchecked. It is not an immediate transformation but a gradual push of moral and ethical lines - until those lines no longer exist.
