Earlier this term we were very proud to launch our brand new website.





The Moon Rocks!

As part of the Skills Based Curriculum in Science, Year 8 students were fortunate enough to have the opportunity to investigate the origin of actual Moon rock and meteorites.

The students thoroughly enjoyed the experience of touching and studying these rare meteorites. The lunar samples, provided by the UK's Science and Technology Facilities Council were collected during NASA's manned space missions to the Moon in the late 1960's and early 1970's.

During these missions the Apollo astronauts brought back to Earth 382 kilograms of lunar material. Most of this material is used by scientists to study the Moon, but NASA decided to use a small proportion of the rock and soil to develop lunar and planetary sciences educational packages. "I thought being given the opportunity to have a hands on look at some fragments of meteorites was a great experience which I will remember for a long time" Harry McInerney

On Friday 15th November Year 10 and 11 Public Service students took part in an Army Day as part of their BTEC coursework. The BTEC Level 2 Diploma in Public Services requires the students to contribute to team-building tasks and provide instruction to others.

The Army Day allowed them to achieve these objectives and the students thoroughly enjoyed participating in tasks which enabled them to develop various Public Service Skills such as teamwork, communication skills and decision making.

The day consisted of students being split into small groups with the objective of working together to achieve a number of set goals. Activities included working together to avoid obstacles and pass a golf ball from one end of the field to the other using a number of tubes and pipes. Students also were required to work together to pass objects from one side of "the river" to another using a number or ropes and a stretcher.

Students particularly enjoyed a strenuous assault course which saw them dodge poles, scramble through a net and negotiate hurdles. It was much harder than it looked!

Preparation for Christmas is an important theme for Advent, but more is involved. Advent gives us a vision of our lives as Christians and shows us the possibilities of life.



The vision of life that Advent gives us is twofold; it looks back to the first coming of Christ at Bethlehem, and it looks to the future when Christ will come again.

In the interval between these two events we find meaning for our life as a Christian. First we celebrate God revealing himself through Jesus Christ, the incarnation – God became man. We view his life and experience, his presence as a human being in our history. Christ came to show us what life can and should be.

He gave us true and valid principles by which we can live true and valid lives. But Jesus knew that the human heart could not live in isolation. He formed the Church around the concept of a people held together by love. In that community we discover unlimited possibilities and meaning. Alone we can do nothing, together we find real meaning. When Christ left this earth, he did not abandon us. He remains with us in his Spirit, the Church, the sacraments, the Scriptures and each other. He lives in community with us and keeps his vision of life before us. When Christ comes again, his presence will no longer be hidden behind the signs and symbols of the liturgy or the words of the Scriptures. His presence among us will be revealed in all its fullness, a presence that will never end, a presence that will perfect and complete our community.

This is the 'greater significance' of Advent. In these few short weeks we take in the sweeping panorama of time – from Christ's birth to his Second Coming. The season of Advent brings us the magnificent vision of life and hope for the future given to us by Christ. Advent is our time to become more involved, more caught up in the meaning and the possibilities of life as a Christian community. Thus we are preparing not only for Christmas but also for Christ's Second Coming. This means that when he comes again, we will be awake and watchful. He will not find us asleep.

Blessed are you, O Lord our God, King of the Universe. You sent your Son to be the Light of the World and to spread his light of love to all. May the growing brightness of the Advent wreath remind us of the approaching nearness of your Son so that the day of His coming may find us prepared and filled with joy. Remembrance Service 2013

In November a service for Remembrance Day was celebrated, which was led by Mr Brown and celebrated by Year 10 in the Hall. This was a very sombre service giving opportunity to our students to be thoughtful and reflective. Students were invited to read real life stories of victims who had died in war. Students watched a very moving, yet hard-hitting PowerPoint presentation of images of war to a very appropriate song called 'Another Hero Lost' by a group called Shadow Falls who are anti-war.

"They shall grow not old, as we that are left grow old. Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn. At the going down of the sun and in the morning, we will remember them".

The words of Laurence Binyon's poem '*For the Fallen*' honour the soldiers who sacrificed their lives during World War 1.

Lourdes

In July students from Years 10,11,12 and 13 went on a pilgrimage to Lourdes, France with Mrs Dunn, Mrs Paterson and two other schools Corpus Christi Catholic High School and Arch Bishop McGrath Catholic High School.

The trip was meant as a short break as well as a religious pilgrimage to broaden our minds, spiritually, through mass and prayer and evaluating ourselves and our position in the faith. We had a lot of time to reflect on ourselves as people and our life experiences. We had the opportunity to go to the bath, which was a daunting experience but after completing it we felt spiritually renewed and healed.

We also completed the torchlight procession as a group. We were all looking forward to this as we had been anticipating if all week and it was meant to be a very solemn experience. Someone was looking forward to it so much (Mrs Dunn) that she managed to kick over a beggar's pot, scattering their money everywhere!! I have never seen anyone go more red in my life! The torchlight procession was definitely the most distinctive part of the pilgrimage to Lourdes. The procession began at 9pm whilst it was still light (during the procession the sun sets and night falls) and the Rosary was spoken. The Our Father was sung in Latin at the beginning of each decade, and then five Hail Marys were said in lots of different languages including French, Spanish, German, Italian, Dutch, Portuguese, Polish and Gaelic. Next Gloria was sung in Latin and in between





each decade a hymn or chant was sung the first being the traditional Lourdes Hymn. At the Ave everyone held up their candle - this was a very humbling experience and we were enchanted by the presence of so many nationalities.

We also had a short amount of free time to explore the area and do a little shopping. We visited a large fort and after climbing the 351 steps we were rewarded with a fabulous view of the whole of Lourdes. On our way back to the hotel with Mrs Dunn we got horribly lost, but this only added to the excitement of the trip.

We had a wonderful time in Lourdes filled with friendship and reflection. It was more than a religious holiday and was a great opportunity to reconcile yourself with God. It was emotional at times which actually enhanced the feelings of well being and spirituality and our relationships with others in our life.

Oxford...culture and art!







On the 15th November GCSE and A Level Art students were invited to spend a day in Oxford, visiting their wonderful art museums.

Journal extract by Fiona Fessey 12D The first museum we visited was The Pitt Rivers Museum. It was extremely interesting - its major theme was how different cultures expressed beauty through art and appearance and it gave us a great opportunity to compare cultural diversity.

We had an introduction from one of the curators, who told us about Chinese women binding their feet. We regard this as abnormal in our own culture. However, at the same period women in Britain were using corsets to make their waists as small as possible. This expression of vanity caused as many health issues and bone damage as the binding of feet.

The second museum we visited was The Ashmolean which had a strong link to my own art project. This museum concentrates on fine art pieces, such as great oil paintings with Biblical reference and extraordinary tapestries and ceramics. We were allowed time to ponder the surroundings, sketch and making notes relevant to our own individual topics. During our visit we went to an exhibition on Francis Bacon - we were told in great detail how he secured his art style by very knowledgeable art critics and curators. We were also shown a documentary showing Bacon at work in his (really untidy) studio, giving us an invaluable window into the life of a real artist.



After a two and three quarter hour flight to Naples we eventually arrived at Solfatara, a shallow volcanic crater at Pozzuoli, near Naples. When we were there we walked around different parts of the crater and stood inside it. We noticed the different temperatures in various places and were fascinated by the restricted areas which contained bubbling mud and the start of a new crater. We had to jump as a group to hear the echo under our feet where the rock had blocked the crater. The stronger boys in the group helped Francesco, our tour guide, to pick up rocks and throw them to witness how easy the sulphuric rock broke. We gathered around Dante's inferno, a man made sauna and volunteers got the opportunity to see how hot it was inside.

On the second day we climbed Mount Vesuvius and stood around the crater where our tour guide, Emanuel, informed us of the characteristics of Mount Vesuvius and gave us an insight into previous eruptions and what would happen if it erupted today. Our visit to Pompeii showed us the impact of the eruption in AD79. We had the chance to stand in the amphitheatre where gladiators fought in battles. We saw the thirteen casts of farmworkers who were engulfed by the eruption in the garden of fugitives. We also walked the streets of a once popular town and sat in the theatre where the people of Pompeii would have enjoyed evenings of entertainment.

On the third day we visited Herculaneum which was covered in mud after Vesuvius erupted. We saw the three hundred skeletons in the boat house, sat in the baths and stood in what was the middle of the swimming pool in the gym next to a bronze fountain. On our last day we drove for two hours along the Almalfi coast. We saw Positano, coastal features and Sophia Loren's home. When we arrived in Almalfi we went into the cathedral of St Andrew. Inside it was beautifully decorated with paintings and holy statues as well as the relics of St. Andrew. After this we went to the beach to enjoy the sun, swim in the sea and play volleyball.

Overall it was an amazing trip. We thoroughly enjoyed it and would recommend the trip to other students studying GCSE Geography!

Transition from Primary to Secondary School...

Year 6 pupils from the non-feeder Primary schools spent a morning in the Technology department as part of their transition preparation. The pupils had a quick tour of the department, met some key staff and took part in a sample lesson which involved designing and manufacturing a simplistic desk tidy. All pupils used a range of equipment including hand held tools as well as the pillar drill and the electric sander. The group produced high quality results in a short space of time and were allowed to take the item home to show their parents / carers.

Chartwells gave primary school students from 32 schools across Newport a chance to show their culinary skills recently in a local cookery competition.

They were tasked with creating and cooking two portions of a healthy and nutritious main course or dessert, suitable for inclusion on a school meals menu for primary school children. From over 500 entries, four students from each year group were short-listed to go into the cook-offs; one of these finals took place in the Food Technology Department at St Joseph's RC High School. The finalists' dishes were then judged on a number of criteria including: flavours, colours, textures, presentation, nutritional balance and the use of regional and seasonal products.

Amongst the judges were: Lynne Phillips – Newport Healthy Schools Co-ordinator; John Ishmael – Chartwells' Regional Manager; Sandra Davies – Head of Technology at St Joseph's RC High School; and Paul Evans. All were impressed with the high standard demonstrated by this year's competitors.

This year's master chef winners were:

• Natasha Griffiths, Year 3, St Joseph's Primary School (winning dish: orange and chocolate scones)

• Jacob Murdoch, Year 4, Glan Usk Primary School (winning dish: chicken pepperonata)

• Ciaran O'Donnell, Year 5, Malpas Court Primary (winning dish: bacon and courgette pasta)

• Darcie Childs, Year 6, Caerleon Endowed Junior School (winning dish: chicken and orange kebabs with salad)

At the final cook-off Mrs Davies said; "Absolutely amazing! The standard seen in this competition is that of much older students." Jacob Murdoch asked "I've really enjoyed the competition, can I enter again next year please?"

An amazing achievement, well done Paige.


Rolin named Young Player of the Year
