INSPECTION RESULTS

'Excellent' all the way...

Estyn Inspectors judged the St. Joseph's RC High School's overall current performance and its prospects for improvement to be 'Excellent' – the highest overall gradings that a school can achieve.

Of the 15 judgements that are made in an inspection, St. Joseph's RC High School achieved 15 'Excellent' gradings out of 15, becoming only the second secondary school in Wales to do so. This means that all aspects of the school's work are judged to have "Many strengths including significant examples of sector-leading practice."

Inspectors judged the excellent features of the school to include the very high standards and progress achieved by pupils, its excellent attendance, the exemplary behaviour of pupils, the quality of teaching and the effective way in which the school cares for, supports and guides pupils.



Making History Real

The Holocaust Educational Trust took 20 Welsh teenagers on the one day trip from Cardiff to Oświecim, Poland last month, aiming to increase knowledge and understanding of the Holocaust based on the premise 'hearing is not like seeing'. The Trust realises that the number of people

who witnessed these deaths and the events leading up to them first hand are reducing quickly and they want to ensure that the horror never forgotten.

St. Joseph's RC High School student Andrew Williams, Year 13 was able to experience Oświęcim first hand. He says:

"It's shocking to think so many people died in such a small space in that amount of time. It was such a needless loss of life, such a waste".


It's almost 70 years since the end of WWII but the horrors of the Holocaust live on in this Polish death camp. Auschwitz is being used in a bid to learn from the past. There are not many places in the world devoid of any sound or life, but Auschwitz is one

of them. DEATHLY SILENCE is the best way to describe the stark, crumbling building where millions of Jews lost their lives.

Georgina Saunders, Year 13 feels it will take some time before what she saw sinks in. She says: "I feel like I need to reflect. It doesn't feel quite real. I don't think I will ever get the image of the piles of hair out of my mind. It was horrible but I'm glad I came. I will never forget it."

The trip was also beneficial to St. Joseph's teacher Mrs Blackwell, who said it will give her a deeper understanding of the topic and would therefore make passing on this knowledge to her students that much easier.

Alfie Testing

AlfieSoft is an online 'numeracy' assessment programme that identifies students' strengths and weaknesses and provides accurate question level data that schools can use to analyse student and group performance in specific curriculum areas, track students' progress and ultimately raise standards by providing further evidence to support teacher assessment.

St. Joseph's used the assessment for Year 7 and Year 8 students. The results were extremely promising.

The Maths Roadshow 2013

The Maths Roadshow came to St. Joseph's RC High School, to demonstrate where and when Mathematics is used within real life.

Year 7, Year 8 and some Year 10 students were shown evidence in jobs such as hairdressing, games designing, sports science and car design.

Students were encouraged to take part in the show, where interactive displays were used to engage students and extend further the link between Mathematics and some potentially exciting employment possibilities.

on their feet. The group were pushed to their limits, and by the last day had progressed to black terrain; an impressive feat considering the time given.



Year 11 Easter Raffle



Year 7B won two out of their two league matches, and qualified for the Round Robin Final of the South East Wales Hockey League on Wednesday. The girls went on to win 3-0 versus Croesyceiliog and won 3-0 versus Bassaleg to becoming South East Wales Year 7B Hockey League winners.

League Results

Year 7A won two out of their three league matches, losing out to Rougemont 2-1 to qualify for the finals.
