CYBERUK has become a key date in the calendar for thought-leaders in cyber security and technical professionals from the UK and around the world. This year SJHS were invited by the NCSC (National Cyber Security Centre) to experience this event.

Our students had the opportunity to participate in a range of experiences with some of the largest IT and security companies from across the world and UK government security agencies

We were the given the privilege to host a meeting with a senior government official to discuss our involvement in the **NCSC CyberFirst Program** and our recognition as a Silver Award CyberFirst school. Lead Minister for Cyber and Chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster, Steve Barclay took part in a Computer Science lesson, discussed with students their cyber education experiences and aspirations for the future in this field.

St Joseph's RC High school was the first state secondary school in Wales to be awarded the Silver Award for the NCSC's CyberFirst school's program.

Over the past 5 years we have developed a challenging, engaging and rewarding curriculum that is centred on computer science, applied digital skills and cyber security. CyberFirst activities are intended to inspire and encourage students from all backgrounds to consider a career in cyber security and apply for a CyberFirst bursary.

Chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster and Lead Cyber Minister, Steve Barclay said:

"These skills are crucial in helping to boost our individual and collective cyber defences from the threats that we face, so I was delighted to see the enthusiasm and passion of both children and teaching staff at the school."

A key component of our success has been our participation in the NCSC's Cyber girl's competition. This has enabled us to provide further opportunities for our school community and to inspire us to achieve more in the cyber world.

The NCSC have been fantastic in giving us guidance, a link to real industry experts and professional learning opportunities. The NDEC team, led by Holly Lidbury, have been particularly supportive and encouraging with our journey as a CyberFirst school. It was great to have Steve Barclay here today to show off what we've managed to achieve so far, and we look forward to some of our students helping shape the UK's cyber future.

Mental Health and Wellbeing Ministry Update

In the ministry of Mental Health and Wellbeing, we have utilised this year to implement many new ideas and solutions to the problems that were created from the tough previous years.

Firstly, Mr Humpage, as the SLT link of our ministry, through extensive preparation and training, launched a Mental Health & Ambassador Program open to all students from a range of all years to ensure that students feel relatable to an ambassador of their age. The ambassadors have been selected through tough application stages and thus we have ensured that these ambassadors will truly help our community and boost the overall morale. These ambassadors will be actively helping students throughout break and lunch periods from next year onwards.

Additionally, we are currently designing and communicating with our school planner designers about a Mood journal. This will be located within the planner and will include resources to allow for better revision and wellbeing tips and to track mood and emotion throughout weeks and months. This will help students to boost their mental health; and this is proven to be one of the best methods to get on top of mental health.

We are also looking to establish mood rooms to allow students to refocus during break and lunch periods. This is currently being initially revised and planned by our ministry and we hope for this to be active by the start of next year.

We will also be providing updates of our ministry by having a

consistent page in the insight in which we will have an array of updates, progress towards targets, tips, tricks, and other information which is helpful.

We are also trialling a Mental Health And Wellbeing podcast. We as a ministry are opening this podcast to all years and it will also be publicly available on the school website within our mental health and wellbeing section. We will include topics like exam revision techniques, health and wellbeing, time management, and stress relief methods and also have some guests like pupils and teachers to tell inspiring stories as well as personal methods of coping with stress and how to effectively revise in exams.

Furthermore, as a ministry, we really consider the mental health and wellbeing of our sixth form and thus we have cooperated with Mr. James and our 6th form ministry members to find out where we can strengthen support for the sixth form students. Examples such as bringing in pathway councillors and specifically trained ambassadors have been considered and will be active soon.

We can't wait to see the impact of our targets next year and prosper even more to better our school community. Have a wonderful summer.

We have a core group and an extra 20 pupil VIPs representing our wide range of ethnicities. 44 ethnicities are represented in our proudly multi-cultural school.

Staff have attended several DARPL training events focussed on anti-racism. Year 7 have been trained by 'Show Racism the Red Card' and Year 9 by Race Cymru. We have started to collaborate further and to share good practice around diversity in the curriculum. Our canteen windows and most classrooms celebrate diversity champions in every subject area. Trey Mathuthu and Tennessee Cruz in Year 10 have attended many workshops with the Black History Wales. Trey even presented at the final conference 'Standing on the shoulders of glants'. Our Diversity ministry and many VIPs have attended many meetings across the school year to plan for change and impact. A new welcome reception has been developed to celebrate diversity and Inclusivity. The Equality policy has been reviewed again and linked to our Strategic Equality Action Plan. In PSHE, Mr Nunn has taught all pupils about our school ethos, our anti-racist stance and how racism must be tackled in 6 stages. This has included education around the official reporting of racist incidents. Many pupils have helped influence our anti-racism banners. Thank you to Miss Durston one of university teachers for helping to finish the design.

These pupils also completed an 18 question audit of the school curriculum and our Year 11 reps analysed all 244 responses. The Finale saw many of these amazing young people presenting at our staff inset day on July 1st. Consequently, all teachers agreed to 3 pledges that will ensure we embrace diversity even more in 2022-23 in our lessons and school curriculum.

Finally, a big thank you to Miss Cooper for all her support across the year, we would not have had this impact without her involvement.

Community Ministry Update



In the Ministry of Community, this year we have dedicated ourselves to providing a more environmentally friendly community for the pupils and staff at St Joseph's.

At the beginning of the year, we set out a list of goals that we aimed to achieve throughout the academic year. Firstly, we discussed implementing permanent recycling bins for students to use in the corridors to ensure that there is no litter on the floor around the school.

Through the support of the Senior Leadership Team and Mr Rowland, we managed to buy many recycling bins to place around the school and we have noticed that the amount of littering has significantly decreased. We hope that students will continue to use them and that they will also recognise the difference that it is making.

Additionally, we set out to remove all of the single-use plastic in the canteen. With the support of Mr Rowland and Chartwells, we replaced the canteen's popular plastic bottled fruit drink with a new set of drinks from a brand called 'Flawsome'. Their drinks are made of 'wonky' fruit that is discarded from supermarkets and usually goes to waste. In our ministry meetings, we tried each of the drink flavours and scored them against one another until we decided on our favourites and they were put into the canteen for students and staff to enjoy. These drinks do not include any single use plastic and are made from recycled fruit waste so are significantly better for the environment. We understand that there are still products that are packaged in single use plastic in our canteen so we will continue to work towards fully meeting this aim.

It has been wonderful to see that we have finally been able to have the Year 6s from the feeder primary schools at St Joseph's for their transition days and the Ministry of Community hope to be able to continue to strengthen the relationship between the pupils at St Joseph's and the feeder schools. We have chosen to produce videos with the current Year 7's so that the primary school students can see what a welcoming and supportive place St Joseph's is. These videos will also provide some top tips for those who are apprehensive about what to expect.

For the upcoming year, we hope to make charity work a significant part of our agenda so that we can bridge the gap between our school and the wider community. We would love to work with local charities to raise money for their organisation's services and we feel that charity work is a great way to educate pupils at our school about important social issues and those who need our support.

As a ministry, we are proud of the progress that we have made so far and cannot wait to see the impact that we can make next year! Have a great summer!



Teaching and Learning Ministry Update

The Teaching and Learning Ministry has been working hard throughout this year to improve education and student experience within the school. In our first meeting, we recognised three areas that needed our attention:

- engaging students' interest
- student-led projects
- developing revision aids

From next year onwards, a new education curriculum will launch and we believed it was important for students to have an active voice in this change. We conducted a survey to identify pupils' interests, the effectiveness of support received by students and what we can do to make exam season less stressful for our students. As a collective, we realised how effective revision techniques can boost confidence during the exam period. There are right and wrong ways to revise and it is not always clear to students what works and what doesn't. As revision is a vital part of school life, we feel that students should not only be taught the curriculum but also how to revise and why certain revision techniques are more effective than others.

To help students, we will be designing an "Effective Revision Techniques" section on the school planners which students can access at any time. Furthermore, to encourage student engagement, one of our sixth form students has launched a Year 7 Maths club called "Roots to Success". This is a revision group led by year 12 students aiming to help Year 7 pupils with school work and developing their maths skills. We hope to continue this project in the years to come as well as expanding to further subject-specific revision clubs led by sixth formers to help our younger students with their learning and develop their interest in education.

NEW CURRICULUM for Wales September 22

In September 2022, our new Year 7 students will be embarking on a new and innovative development in Welsh education.

As part of Welsh Government's agenda of developing young people with the skills needed for their future, we will be adopting the new Welsh curriculum along with all secondary schools in Newport, and all of our cluster primary schools.

The new Curriculum for Wales is designed to prepare pupils to understand the connectivity between their learning and to explore authentic, real-life examples of how and why their learning is important. There are four core purposes which drive the new curriculum as we strive to help pupils become:

- ambitious, capable learners, ready to learn throughout their life
- enterprising, creative contributors, ready to play a full part in life and work
- ethical, informed citizens, ready to take part in Wales and the world
- healthy, confident individuals, ready to lead a fulfilling life as a valued member of society.

At St Joseph's, we have been preparing for this over the last three years and have successfully piloted two new schemes with our current Year 7. These have been very well received by pupils, and as we progress through the new curriculum, we will update and amend our provision annually so that we reflect our ever-changing world to suit the requirements of all pupils. As teachers, this will enable us to deliver learning experiences which allow pupils to recognise their learning in real-life situations and contexts, and to appreciate the connections between subjects.

As a Catholic school, we are also excited about how seamlessly the four core purposes align with our Catholic Virtues which are at the centre of our curriculum, and enable us to support pupils and parents in their faith journey.

Form AND Function

Hello my name is Christian, and what you're seeing in the picture is the very creation that I've been putting several lunches and hours into, from product research to the designing stages and getting a final idea of what I want it to look like. I decided to not go for something generic and something that everyone does. Instead, my whole goal was to be different. Why make something that already exists when you can innovate and create your minds desire. But first of all, to inspire my design I look at modern designers like artistic director of Louis Vuitton's menswear, Virgil Abloh and major figure in architecture, Zara Hadid. Both of the designers have inspired me to make an abstract design with the incorporation of curves and modernism.

From the curves on the side panels to the open storage space for numerous things, I have merged both worlds incorporating both art/design and functionality. Two worlds, two sides, two different purposes. Yet I reached an equilibrium between the two. This product may look all artsy and abstract but it has a lot of purpose to it like a decorative piece for your furniture in your house that accounts to also being storage. It's big enough to fit pairs of shoes and its open air design lets the shoes breathe and let them be shown off to whomever may lay their eyes upon it. The design is meant to both compliment its environment and be able to have the function fit for the daily average person. I innovated such a product because everyone wants to be organised, but of course how do you even become organised when you don't have a place to put it. Its open air design makes it easy to use and is both aesthetically pleasing to the human eye, thus making you actually want to put more things in it. This is in benefit of both the use of the product and the consumer in use of it. I'm not here to make a difference. I'm here to have an impact but know my impact will make a difference.

The Liquid Spillage Stopper

I am a year 11 student currently sitting GCSE exams. I chose 3 individual subjects to take for my GCSEs and one of these subjects was Product Design. The Product Design GCSE came with a theory exam and coursework which included a practical. For the practical we had to make a product that either had finding and fixing problems qualities, biomimicry qualities or designer qualities. For the product I made (referred to as "The Liquid Spillage Stopper") I incorporated the finding and fixing as well as the biomimicry qualities. The main function of the product I made is to prevent and minimise the risk of liquid in a mug accidentally being spilled when transported around the workplace, houses or restaurants.

The Liquid Spillage Stopper is an interesting and simple product that uses the principles of physics to move a cup or mug full of liquid without the liquid spilling out. My main inspiration for designing and manufacturing this product was down to my dad's love for drinking tea. I noticed that there was a tendency to sometimes spill the tea when transporting his mug around the house, so I decided to design and create a product that will rule out any spillage. The device holds the cup or mug with liquid in it and no matter how much it is swung around, the liquid will not spill. This means that the liquid can be transported from one place to another, without a single spillage. This is particularly useful for carrying hot drinks which have the ability to spill without the appropriate care, eliminating the risk of getting burnt and ensuring that health and safety standards are met.

MOONBASE ALPHA Sustainable living







This year, we have closely worked with our Science and Computer Science department to enable multiple opportunities for our pupils to become ambitious, capable and ready to learn throughout their life.

The idea of this project was to demonstrate to Year 7 pupils the importance of sustainable living in harsh and challenging habitats. We studied the need of a human colonization in an off-world setting. This allowed us to create a range of design proposals, drawn and rendered in 3D for human habitation upon the moon. We created models with recycled materials and photographed them from various angles. The photos then had their backgrounds removed and a space scene added, using a free program called **<u>Paint.net</u>**. Pupils learnt a variety of graphical techniques including perspective, isometric and oblique drawing, model making, computer graphics, processing and presentation skills.

The knowledge and deep understanding gained through experiencing science and technology has helped learners to become creative contributors, embrace challenges, encouraged to take risks and learn to develop solutions. Thus, they can become more resilient and purposeful learners across all areas of learning and experience.

PATAGONIA



TAITH I BATAGONIA 2022



On the 10th of April 2022, the Welsh Department took 25 pupils from Years 8-13 to Patagonia in South America for 10 days.

Days 1 and 2

We set off from school at 2am to make our way to Heathrow Airport and our 1st of 3 flights to Houston Texas, followed by a flight to Buenos Aires before finally arriving at Patagonia on Monday night, absolutely shattered but all looking forward to our Patagonian adventures the next day.

Day 3

After breakfast, we met with our knowledgeable tour guide Carina who walked us to the Paleontological museum in Patagonia. We were taught how the land had changed to form South America and all the different species that lived in Argentina before being show a documentary about the largest dinosaur to ever be discovered in the world in Patagonia called the "Patagotitan" as well as the laboratories where the palaeontologists worked on this discovery.



We then visited a Welsh speaking primary school called, "Ysgol yr Hendre" and were warmly greeted by Year 4 and 5 pupils who sang songs in Welsh to us and recited poetry that they had learnt in Welsh for their school Eisteddfod. Both Ysgol yr Hendre pupils and St Joseph's pupils were speaking to each and playing games in Welsh. What an unforgettable experience that was.

We then went to Pueto Madryn to see where the Welsh people had originally landed in 1865 and made a home for themselves and their families. In May 1865, 150 Welsh people set sail from Liverpool on the tea-clipper boat called, "Mimosa" and arrived in Puerto Madryn 8 weeks later on 27th July having travelled over 8,000 miles. We met some very friendly local volunteers who told us the history of the landings all through the medium of Welsh.

Day 4

Today, we travelled to Playa Union and went on a dolphin watching boat trip. The Tonina Overa or Panda dolphins are unique to Patagonia and were absolutely spectacular to get up close to as they look like mini orca whales. We all had lots of fun trying to spot them whilst on the boat, but Mrs Davies wishes that she had brought her sea legs!

After the dolphin watching, we went to Punta Tomba where we could walk amongst the Magellanic penguins before they migrate back to Brazil. The Magellanic penguin was named by the Portuguese explorer Ferdinand Magellan, whose crew spotted it while sailing around the tip of South America. The penguins were really friendly and considering we visited at the end of their breeding season, there were still lots of penguins there as well as armadillos in the wild and red llamas wandering around!

Day 5

Today we visited the town of Gaiman and specifically the Regional Historical Museum, the Old Railway Station and the Bethal Chapel as we followed in the footsteps of the Welsh settlers. After speaking to and meeting lots of different Welsh speaking tour guides, we then had a traditional Welsh afternoon tea in "Plas y Coed" tearooms with Welsh cakes, Welsh tea, cakes and bara brith. Absolutely delicious!

Day 6

So today we said goodbye to Carina our tour guide, who had provided us with plenty of memories of Patagonia and we headed off to Buenos Aires. We were all sad to leave Patagonia but we gave Carina our Welsh flag signed by all of us so a piece of St Joseph's will remain in Patagonia.

Day 7

We met Antonella, our fabulous tour guide in Buenos Aires along with Alex "the legend" bus driver! We had a full day of sight seeing in Buenos Aires as we walked down the Casa Rosada Presidential on the Plaza de Mayo and saw many landmarks such as the Teatro Colon. We walked down the Grand Avendida de Mayo, explored the cobblestone streets of San Telmo (the birth place of the tango) and saw tango dancers. We saw the famous Boca Junior football stadium along with the brightly pained house of La Boca before ending our day visiting the grave of Evita.
