





Easter Message



"He then began to teach them that the Son of Man must suffer many things and be rejected by the elders, the chief priests and the teachers of the law, and that he must be killed and after three days rise again." Mark 8:31

This time of year, many Christians look forward to Easter - chocolate bunnies, coloured eggs, fun activities, social events, and more. What's not to love? But Easter is more than this, and its significance extends to more than just one day. To fully appreciate the resurrection of Jesus, it is helpful to understand and appreciate what took place beforehand.

Starting with Palm Sunday the beginning of Holy Week. Holy Week is a time for reflection and study – a time to look into the events leading to the death and resurrection of Jesus. In Scripture, you may find descriptions of these events in the Gospels as well as references from other New Testament passages. Two of the most important things to reflect on during this time is Maundy Thursday and Good Friday.

On Maundy Thursday, we commemorate the day on which Jesus Christ shared the Last Supper with his 12 disciples, prior to his crucifixion. Jesus washed the disciples' feet before the meal in order to demonstrate the importance of serving others. In addition to the foot-washing and His new commandment 'to love one another,' Maundy Thursday recognises the Last Supper. Jesus blessed the bread and wine as a symbol of his body and blood, which He would sacrifice the very next day. After this blessing, Jesus tells his disciples to "do this in remembrance" of him. That is the reason we still observe the Lord's Supper today.

Even though the death of Jesus was a horrific and sorrowful event, the Friday before Easter is appropriately called "Good" Friday because it is only through his sacrifice that we are given life – eternal life. Romans 4:25 tells us that Jesus "was delivered up for our trespasses and raised for our justification. Good Friday is the perfect time to thank God for the sacrifice of Jesus. He gave his only Son so that we might live! Could there be any greater gift?

Take time on Good Friday to reflect on the sins you have contributed to the pain Jesus endured, and ask God for forgiveness and cleansing. This might be painful, but the good news is that as soon as you ask for forgiveness, it is given to you. As we approach Holy Week, let us take a few extra minutes out of our day to thank God for his endless mercy and forgiveness and His unconditional love.

Recognizing the days leading up to Easter prepares our hearts and minds to fully appreciate the most important aspect of the season: the Resurrection! For in the Resurrection of Jesus we find our hope of eternal life. This event in the life of the early disciples changed everything. Before the Resurrection, they were cowering behind closed doors – hiding out in fear—but after the Resurrection, their faith was renewed and strengthened. The Resurrection of Jesus was given to us as proof for the Gospel – the Good News. Build your faith in the Resurrection of Jesus Christ just as the early church did.

Love starts here!


We are delighted to announce that the refurbishment of our school library is now complete.





The statistcic shown above describes the impact of the pandemic on the mental health of students. Throughout the academic year our resilient Ministry of Mental Health and Wellbeing has created solutions and adjustments, in focus areas, to boost the Mental Health And Wellbeing of our students. We have tried to listen to all of our communities suggestions, such as electing Mental Health Ambassadors.

As a Ministry, we believe that this was a key area to focus on, so through extensive preparation and training we have launched a Mental Health & Ambassador Program. It is open to all students, from all year groups, to ensure everyone is able to relate to an ambassador of their own age. Our ambassadors have been selected through a tough application process and we trust they will truly help our community and to boost overall student morale. These ambassadors will be available throughout break/lunch.

We are also designing a Mood Journal. This will be enclosed within pupils' planners and will include resources such as better revision hints, wellbeing tips and charts to track mood and emotion throughout each term. This will help students track their mental health and boost their feeling of wellbeing - this can be one of the best methods to get on top of our mental health. We are also looking to establish mood rooms within the near future to allow for students to refocus during break and lunch periods.

Watch out for the Mental Health and Wellbeing Podcast too! This podcast will be open to all year groups and will also be accessable on the school website within our Mental Health and Wellbeing section. We will include topics like exam revision techniques, health and wellbeing, time management and stress relief methods and also have some guests like pupils and teachers to tell inspiring stories and personal methods of coping with stress and how

to effectively revise in exams. We will also be bringing in students with stories to see,so keep an eye out!

Further more as a ministry really consider the mental health and wellbeing of our sixth form and thus we have cooperated with Mr James and our Sixth Form ministry members to find out where we can strengthen support for the sixth form students. Example such as bringing in pathway councillors and specifically trained ambassadors have been considered and will be active soon.

This is only just the start of our ministry and we cant wait to make even more progress and see the impact. We all have open ears to your ideas so if you see any of our members or Mr Humpage, please feel free to talk to us about your suggestions.
