Year 10 were able to listen to each of the Welsh personalities story of how the Welsh language has had an impact on their life as well as using the Welsh language to create their own poetry with the current Wales Children's Poet, Nia Morais, in Welsh and learning about how to learn Welsh by illustrating it along the way with Josh Morgan or Sketchy Welsh.

Many of our regular library users are also active members of the St Joseph's EC(H)O environmental group, so when The Reading Agency (thereadingagency.org) contacted us to let us know about a library display competition, the group sprang into action.

Their mission? To create an attractive and imaginative display and inspire St Joseph's pupils and staff to think about the impact of waste on the earth's Ocean. With the help of Ms McCarthy (librarian), Miss Griffiths (Product Design and Technology), and Mrs Neal (Art), some of our creative Year 7 pupils built and painted a huge Whale tail diving into a pile of plastic bottles, cans and other rubbish collected from around the school. We also compiled a list of books with a nature theme which are on display in the library alongside a copy of 'Ocean' by Sir David Attenborough and Colin Butfield, which was gifted to schools by The Reading Agency.

We think our Whale turned out beautifully and is an impactful visual representation of the damage that can be done to the environment if we don't think about how we dispose of litter. What is encouraging, is the fact that the rubbish we used was largely collected from the recycling bins around the school – proving that at St Joseph's we continue to do a great job of reducing, recycling and reusing.



### **Cyber Security Airbus Trip**

As Year 10 Computer Science students, our visit to Airbus was an unforgettable experience. We met industry experts, explored the world of cyber security, and got a rare glimpse of high-level equipment and operations. Airbus, a global leader in commercial aviation, defence, and space, gave us insight into the importance of security in protecting sensitive government work. Due to the nature of their work, we had to surrender our electronics and were closely escorted throughout the visiteven to the bathroom—which

only added to the sense of excitement! We were shown a fascinating presentation outlining Airbus's work on everything from fighter jets and satellites to helicopters and commercial aircraft. We spoke to an electrical engineer specialising in robotics and Al, learning how long-lasting systems are developed and maintained by expert teams. We were also surprised to learn about the environmental impact of Al technologies like ChatGPT, including the high energy and water usage needed to cool

the systems. Later, we met apprentices working in Airbus' cyber security division and gained valuable career insights from a final speaker, Gareth who is one of the leading cyber threat hunters for AirBus, who explained the many different roles in the field. We discovered that passion and experience matter more than specific subjects studied.

## Year 10 CyberGirls Trip

While most students were enjoying a well-earned lie-in on INSET day, 15 of our dedicated Year 10 Computer Science students chose to spend their morning exploring the world of cyber security at the CyberGirls event, hosted by CyberFirst at Cardiff Metropolitan University's Llandaff Campus. The day offered a rich programme of activities, beginning with inspiring talks from women working in the cyber security industry. These sessions highlighted the diverse career paths available and provided valuable insights into how different routes can lead into this dynamic and growing sector.

Students then took part in hands-on workshops, including one on asymmetric encryption using physical props – a box, two locks, and a set of keys – to demonstrate the principles behind secure digital communication. In another interactive session, students became cyber investigators, working with the Intellectual Property Office (IPO) to analyse digital footprints and uncover key pieces of intelligence. One of the highlights of the day was a thought-provoking session on Computing and the Law, which encouraged students to explore the sometimes-blurred lines between legal frameworks and ethical considerations. Our students rose to the challenge of a mock courtroom trial, with Genevieve, Deedee, Faith and Isabella confidently stepping into the roles of barristers and defendants.

The event concluded with an exciting Capture the Flag competition, where students worked in small teams to solve a series of cyber puzzles. This tested their computational thinking, problem-solving, and collaboration skills – and our students absolutely shone. It was great to see all the girls being so enthusiastic about the competition, and our own Seren Adams won a prize (Amazon vouchers) for highest answer accuracy!

A fantastic day full of learning, challenge, and inspiration – well done to all who took part!

## **Cyber Explorers**

During March and April, we (Arabela Pinera, Isabelle Adams, Emme Jones and Olly LDC) completed a group of challenges for the Cyber Explorers Award. By doing these challenges we had the opportunity to receive qualifications similar to a GCSE. The challenges ranged in difficulty and used aspects from many areas of computer science including digital forensics and open-source intelligence. They were also split into two sections, Challenges (easier) and Missions (harder). Through this we were also able to discover some different career paths with the cyber industry.

The Challenge section included us helping characters solve problems. For example, telling an influencer what they can and cannot post on social media for their own safety (like their passwords and etc). In the Missions section, we would be presented with a task that we must complete, utilising more advanced cyber skills. At the end of each section, we would had a final challenge, a final boss, which would challenge our knowledge that we previously learnt in the smaller sections which would create the bulk of the challenges and missions.

The Cyber Explorers Cup is a UK-wide, government-backed cybersecurity competition designed for students aged 11-14. It is part of the Cyber Explorers educational programme - a free online learning platform created by the UK government that teaches young learners cybersecurity basics such as digital forensics, encryption, secure communication, network security, and the UK's Computer Misuse Act.







## INECRAFT By SJHS Digital Leaders

Over the course of this year we have been running a KS3 Minecraft club. We have held three competitions designed to help members to develop their cyber skills and to gain more interest in the field of graphic design. As a school, we have been aiming to strike the interest of the younger year groups and allow them to see the endless possibilities that exist within Computer Science. Part of our plan with the Minecraft Club was to give pupils the opportunity to take part in different areas of computer science they don't see in lessons.

Our first competition, 'Grand Designs: A Minecraft Challenge', was designed to give the pupils a taste of what graphic design is like. We asked pupils to get into small groups and design a building and they were judged on their creativity, technical skills and their ability to work in a team. It was important to us that we allowed pupils to develop their conversational and social skills, alongside skills that are a key part of computer science. Year 8 team, 'The Humblerods' excelled and won the competition by over seven points. We are extremely proud of the work this team put into their design. They made a computer system within Minecraft that depicted another game of Minecraft, this extremely innovative design captured the attention of all the digital leaders and several members of staff.

So a huge congratulations to Charlie Vaughan, Nimrod Kekesi and Caelan Jays from 8V, you truly blew us away! Further congratulations to all the other pupils that took part in this competition, we are proud of you all and cannot believe how well you have done!

Our second competition was designed to appeal to the cyber security side of computer science. We wanted to show the pupils how many different fields you can go into within this technological sector. The competition, 'Attack the Egg', required pupils to get into small groups and build some form of protective system that would stop the digital leaders from reaching a hidden egg within a set time limit (3 minutes). They were again judged on their creativity, security and teamworking skills. Year 9 team named 'Oopy Goopy' won - their design demonstrated excelled graphic design and amazing security. None of the three digital leaders were able to penetrate their design within the time limit. So another big congratulations to May Vincent and Deona Danie in 9E for winning this competition and demonstrating the true value of cyber security within today's society, and well done to all the other pupils who took part in this

competition as you once again blew us away!

Our final competition is still in progress, designed to allow the pupils to explore the capabilities of technology, whilst enjoying! We gave the pupils a brief to design a new ride for the theme park Alton Towers, so we are very excited to see what the pupils come up with and hope that they will continue to demonstrate the best of their abilities.

As Digital Leaders we aim to inspire the younger pupils to get involved with technology and be aware of the many opportunities that exist within computer science if they want to explore that field of work. We hope that through this club and many other things we are able to achieve this.
















### Year 13 Chemistry Trip

# CONGRATS

Year 12 pupil Joe, won the prestigious Cambridge University Fitzwilliam College Architectural Design Competition

#### This was Joe's submitted design narrative:

Seamless integration of interior and exterior spaces: A sustainable design inspired by the built and natural environment in Fitzwilliam College to enhance social interaction.


Embarking on a journey through Fitzwilliam College, I immersed myself in its architectural landscape through a self-guided tour, allowing me to conduct a comprehensive site analysis. This exploration involved a study of the site's topography, sun path and the social flow of students within the college, ensuring that my design would be contextually informed and functionally effective.

A significant observation was the congregation of students around the college café, which was overcrowded and lacked the spatial qualities conducive to a productive and serene atmosphere. Consequently, my primary design objective became the creation of an open, multifunctional hub that alleviates congestion whilst fostering an environment that promotes both collaboration and tranquillity.

Positioning the building was a critical decision. I situated it to the northeast of Wilson Court, adjacent to mature trees, ensuring minimal disruption to the existing ecological framework. Other potential locations, such as Fellows' Court, were dismissed due to the presence of mature trees and open spaces integral to the college's character. The selected site offered optimal solar orientation, allowing clerestory windows to harness daylight from east to west, cultivating a luminous and stimulating atmosphere that enhances productivity.

Fitzwilliam College's architectural identity is a juxtaposition of Brutalist and Modernist styles, exemplified by the geometric rigidity of New Court and the dynamic interplay of slants and curves in the Olisa Library. Inspired by this contrast, my design sought to synthesize these elements, ensuring that the hub coalesces with the existing architecture whilst maintaining a sense of familiarity for students and faculty. Additionally, the overarching theme of openness inherent in the college's design guided my approach, serving as a counterbalance to the over-stimulation experienced in the confined café space.

To achieve this, I extracted defining architectural features from various college buildings and amalgamated them into a cohesive vision. The clerestory windows from The Hall Building were incorporated to maximize natural illumination, whilst the cylindrical brick structure of the Olisa Library was reinterpreted and enveloped within a sleek, modern overhang that provides both shade and



aesthetic contrast. The ground floor was left entirely open, reinforcing the concept of fluidity between interior and exterior spaces, thus establishing a harmonious dialogue between built form and nature.

A recurring motif within the college is its intrinsic relationship with nature. The abundance of vegetation and the presence of wildlife contribute to an immersive experience that blurs the boundary between architecture and the natural world. Recognising this, I integrated verdant elements into my design, not only as an aesthetic complement but also as a functional component for additional roof insulation. This biophilic approach ensures that the building is not an imposition on the landscape but rather an extension of it, reinforcing the notion of coexistence with nature.

Ultimately, this design aspires to be more than just a structural solution to spatial congestion; it is envisioned as a sanctuary—an environment where students can retreat, surrounded by greenery, natural light and open space, experiencing the same immersive connection with nature that defines the essence of Fitzwilliam College.


