Harvest Festival

The Sixth Form Leadership team organised this brilliant initiative with Riya John and Lucy Hurley at the helm planning and leading a whole school assembly online explaining the importance of harvest. Anita Panasiuk created a beautiful sign promoting Harvest. The girls explained how this season celebrates a time of year when crops have been gathered from the field. People can reflect and show gratitude for the food in which they have. Christians give thanks to God for all the food and good things he provides for his people. Harvest challenges us to be generous towards others which is one of the Catholic virtues we practice at St Joseph's.

Some facts and statistics about donations include:

- 1 in 5 in the UK live below the poverty line
- 2, 416 three day emergency food supplies were given to people of Newport by the select charity we will be donating to
- In 2023/2024 over 3.1 million people used a food bank in the United kingdom.

The request for food items were donated to our local community and Newport Food Bank stated 'On behalf of Newport Foodbank and the families we serve, we'd like to thank you all at St. Joseph's RC High School for once again collecting 262kg of donations for us at your Harvest Festival. An amazing amount, which almost doubled last year's donations! We have seen an increase of people accessing us due to the cost of living crisis and your donations have already helped many needy people in our area.

Cafod

Pupils have raised a brilliant amount for CAFOD so far this year. £830 has been donated so far. This money was raised through The Chase, The Big Walk and CAFOD Café. A representative from CAFOD Wales visited the school and collected the money.

Youth Chaplaincy

During October, the Youth Chaplaincy team prepared a liturgy of the Rosary. Pupils visited the chapel to celebrate 5 decades of the Rosary.





OPERATION WALLACEA

Expedition to the Knepp Estate

First of all, I would like to thank all those who have supported me in receiving a £1,000 bursary to go on an Operation Wallacea 1-week Expedition to the Knepp Estate in August 2024, especially Mr Nunn. I'm confident that without his support in writing a fantastic letter of recommendation to support my application, I may not have been successful. I would absolutely encourage looking out for bursaries and applying for them for any expedition you want to do. You never know what the outcome of that will be. To those who have never heard of the Knepp Estate before, it is the UK's premiere rewilding site for nature, and is a 3,500-acre estate in West Sussex in England that was previously intensively farmed for pasture and crops. It is owned by Charlie Burrell and Isabella

Why was there a need to rewild the estate?

• Charlie Burrell and Isabella Tree both decided to abandon the site for agriculture,

as this site of mostly Low-Weald Clay was very marginal to farm, leaving them in heavy debt by 2001.

- They soon were inspired by a Dutch ecologist called Dr. Frans Vera, where they were inspired by the concept of 'rewilding', where nature is allowed to 'take the wheel' and re-colonise without much human intervention.
- This inspired them to try to rewild Knepp gradually, by receiving EU subsidies and funding support to provide land for biodiversity gain, by finishing up harvests gradually from 2001-2009 and letting nature take over.

What needed to be done for this rewilding to happen?

• In order for nature to re-colonise without creating a monoculture of species, herbivore engineers were needed, namely the 'Knepp Big 5'.

- These herbivores (Tamworth pigs, fallow deer, red deer, Exmoor ponies & English longhorn cows) are proxies for their ancestors who once roamed and browsed ancient Britain, creating a mosaic of habitats in the process.
- This mosaic of habitats was achieved by the herbivores browsing dominant plant species to keep their spread controlled to allow recessive plants, such as the scarlet pimpernel (key for turtle doves!) to survive.

What does the Knepp Estate look like today?

- 23 years later, the Knepp Estate is a revolutionary key haven for British wildlife. Many rare bird species like the turtle dove are present in much larger numbers than anywhere else, and reptile, invertebrate, bat and plant species have become incredibly biodiverse in such a short timeline.
- Not only has nature been able to recover, but there is an entire team of staff that work regularly on the Knepp Estate as tour guides, ecologists, etc, all supported by the Knepp Estate's successful, low-impact eco-tourism and field courses.

What impact has this expedition had on me?

- I was able to learn all about the Knepp Estate, but also truly experience what it feels like to have no barrier from nature in our campsite; we had wildflower meadows in walking distance and could hear a wealth of birdsong every night and morning. I felt the most happy and least anxious I had ever been!
- I learnt how to survey for a wide range of taxa, including reptiles, birds, invertebrates, large mammals, bats, etc, and about the philosophy of rewilding & its many benefits for nature.

- I now feel that I have broadened my passion for wildlife through the expedition, by developing more of a curiosity in deciphering what birds I can recognise and what I can't in my garden's birdsong, for example.
- I am absolutely certain now that a career in conservation is what's right for me, as I enjoyed every activity of our expedition, and working in a team of like-minded individuals is refreshing and enables even better results & efforts.

Where can I read more and what are your next steps?

I hope you have enjoyed reading about my trip to the Knepp Estate. I would absolutely recommend visiting and supporting nature local to you, whether that's visiting nature reserves or estates like Knepp, or even just appreciating the nature in your local park or garden!

So far, I'd like to achieve four things this school year:

- 1 Continuing Eco Rep bioblitz and survey meetings.
- 2 Continuing our once-per-term litter picks
- **3** Kickstarting a wildflower strip on the school field to increase on-site biodiversity.

MFL/GCHQ

In November, Year 9 students took part in a nationwide competition run by GCHQ. GCHQ is one of the three UK Intelligence and Security Agencies, along with MI5 and the Secret Intelligence Service (MI6).

It was an online event with students working in groups of up to 4 in break times, lunchtimes and after school. This is the 3rd year that the competition has run and we are hoping to build on our success from last year when we were the winning team for Wales! Results to be announced shortly!

This competition requires students to solve problems and decipher codes in different languages from around the world, including rare and artificial languages. With the competition, GCHQ hopes to promote language learning in schools and encourage uptake of languages at GCSE, as well as highlighting the many transferable skills language learning can develop both in education and the world of work.

It was a fantastic day and really helped some of our older pupils in making decisions on further education and career journey's in Creative Arts.








The USW Cyber Competition, is aimed at KS4 and 5 students across the whole of Wales and the South West of England. This is it's first year of running and SJHS entered a strong contingent of 34 teams made up from a mixture of year 10 and 11 GCSE computer scientists, Year 12 & 13 A level computing students and Year 12 & 13 Cam Tec IT students. The competition organisers contacted us to say we had the most entries out of every school!

Over the week long competition, students needed to complete a series of problem-solving challenges, winning points in order to progress to the competition final. 12 teams from England and 20 from Wales will progress to the finals. After all the results had been counted, we had three teams that have made it through.

Its great to see so many Year 10's make it through to the finals, having competed against Year 12 and 13 Computing students! Our top team came 4th in Wales, while our second placed team, Code Monkeys who are made entirely of Year 10's, placed 10th in the whole of Wales! The three teams will now compete in the regional finals at USW, Newport along with seven other teams from the area later next year. We wish them all good luck for the finals!
