Both our St. Josephs' teams did extremely well being one of the first teams to complete the Tarsia Puzzle and winning the Ten Questions round! Both teams demonstrated a strong ability in Maths while working really well together as a team! Well done to all who took part!



# SJHS Engineering Team

In October 2018 a group of Year 12 students began their annual engineering project as part of the Engineering Education Scheme Wales.





This project involved working alongside Orb Steel works, Newport.
