
Black History Month always provides a great opportunity for us to recognise the outstanding contributions people of African and Caribbean descent have made to our country and the world over many generations.

At St Joseph's we are committed to ensuring black history is recognised and celebrated throughout the school year. To ensure this is done we have formed a working party with students and teachers passionate about Black History who will meet monthly in 2021 to discuss their ideas about embedding Black History within the new curriculum.

As well as recognising Black History Month during PSHE sessions, several of our sixth form students attended an informative discussion on race & learning by panellist's Foluke Adebisi and Abu-Bakr Madden Al-Shabazz. This event was organised by an ex student, Andrew Ogun. The focus of this event was the Power of Education which highlighted the importance of schools in bringing about racial equality.

RACE EQUALITY FIRST

At the start of term, 10 St Joseph's teachers attended a training session with Race Equality First.

The focus was on the equality Act of 2019, types of discrimination in society, hate crimes and good practice preventing discrimination.

Clear advice was also provided about ways to promote antiracism in society and education. We all benefitted from the wellrun sessions and intend to work with Race Equality First more in the near future.



Advent

"The people who walked in darkness has seen a great light; on those who live in a land of deep shadow a light has shone... For there is a child born for us, a son given to us, and authority is laid on his shoulders. And he will be called Wonderful Counsellor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace." Isaiah 9:2, 6-7

For me the phrase of this year has to be 'we are living in unprecedented times' which is all too true and no doubt we will continue to do so for some to come, and at the end of this year we will look back and reflect on this very different and difficult year.

For Christians, the four weeks before Christmas are known as Advent, and the Bible readings we hear in the season of Advent also encourage us to look back and reflect on another 'unprecedented' event. An event which happened 2000 years ago, during a time of challenge when - the Bible tells us people walked in darkness, longing for signs of light and hope. This has also been a year when people have needed signs of hope. Perhaps the most obvious were the rainbows that displayed our gratitude for the courage and compassion of our NHS and key workers. We've needed these signs because 2020 has not been easy for any of us. For many it's been incredibly difficult. Some people went through lockdown feeling terribly lonely. Some have experienced illness and loss. Some have known the sadness of family conflict. Some continue to feel anxious about the months ahead. Now as a very different Christmas approaches, with us distanced from loved ones and unable to take part in our usual Christmas traditions, there's a risk these feelings may once again revisit. So, it's really important we remember the things that helped us stay hopeful over the worst months of 2020. Things like music, exercise, playing, talking, writing, reading, volunteering, prayer and faith.

Soon we'll remember the beginnings of another unlikely saviour. A small baby, born in a poor stable, to unknown parents from an ordinary town, who from his birth became the greatest sign of hope the world had ever seen. Whose arrival, or advent, had been dreamed about for centuries, as revealed in this Bible reading by prophet Isaiah, written 700 years before the first Christmas.

This unlikely sign of hope has, for over 2000 years, inspired billions of others to bring light to the world too. Like the many missionaries, providing practical and spiritual help in places of conflict and poverty; like the staff here in this school, who have worked so hard this year to help our pupils grow in knowledge; like our key workers and NHS staff, whose courage and compassion we remembered with rainbows. What about you?

Will you be inspired to be a sign of hope to others this Advent and Christmas season? Will you use the lessons learned in lockdown, the things that helped you to cope, to support others this Christmas and beyond?

I want to return to the theme of hope, and I want to return to the good news that Christmas gives us; of a God who loves us and a God who is on our side. I want to return to the message of Christmas, that says when the baby was born in Bethlehem God came to live amongst us and that He promised that He would remain amongst us to encourage, to inspire, to build a future. And that means that as a Church, as the people of God, as those who believe and follow Jesus, that we want to be this Christmas, people of light. People who in the midst of the darkness will bring hope and love and joy and peace to those whom we encounter. And yes, we won't be able to do it in the usual way. We won't just be able to invite people in and sing with them or preach to them. We shall have to find new ways of getting our message across, of going out of way to deliver goodness to people's homes even those we can't spend time with them. We shall have to find new ways of passing on the gift of peace that comes at Christmas through the birth of our Saviour, Jesus Christ.

Lord Jesus, Master of both the light and the darkness, send your Holy Spirit upon our preparations for Christmas. We who have so much to do and seek quiet spaces to hear your voice each day, We who are anxious over many things look forward to your coming among us. Amen

Global Social Leaders

Over the lockdown period our pupils were given the opportunity to participate in the Global Social Leaders Summer Catalyst @ Home programme.

We would like to thank and celebrate the 49 participants of the Global Social Leaders from our school. Our heartfelt congratulations to these pupils who demonstrated such passion, energy and creativity with the aim to contribute to the Sustainable Development Goals and help bring about a transformational social change.

The students took part in three different phases over the duration of the four-week programme. Phase one consisted of a 5-day morning course, delivered live by Future Foundations expert facilitators and guest speakers including Vicky Carter, a BBC Reporter who taught the young participants how to create their own podcasts.

Following the course, in phase two, the participants took part in independent challenges from home and in their local community such as:

• Ellen MacArthur Foundation - Challenged participants to learn about the circular economy and apply learning to

rethink how chocolate bars are packaged and delivered to help reduce ocean plastics

- Small Robot Company Challenged participants to design a farm machine of the future
- The Eden Project Challenged participants to say #iwill4nature

This phase identified that to support impactful organisations moving forward, the participants were to volunteer their time to pledge (fund raise), publish (raise awareness) or power (create a campaign). Once they had completed a challenge, they were invited to record a podcast about an issue they are passionate about utilising all their skills they picked up on during phase one of the programme.

Phase three is all about reflection and graduating from the GSL Summer Catalyst, which saw young people support 187 different organisations and raise over £16,000 for local charities.

We are very proud of our socially conscious pupils who are speaking up and taking action. Achieving noble goals both globally and in our communities. A special congratulations to Angelica Winterflood, Angelica completed the programme and raised a massive £244 for the Wallich, a Welsh Homelessness and rough sleeping Charity. Well done.


