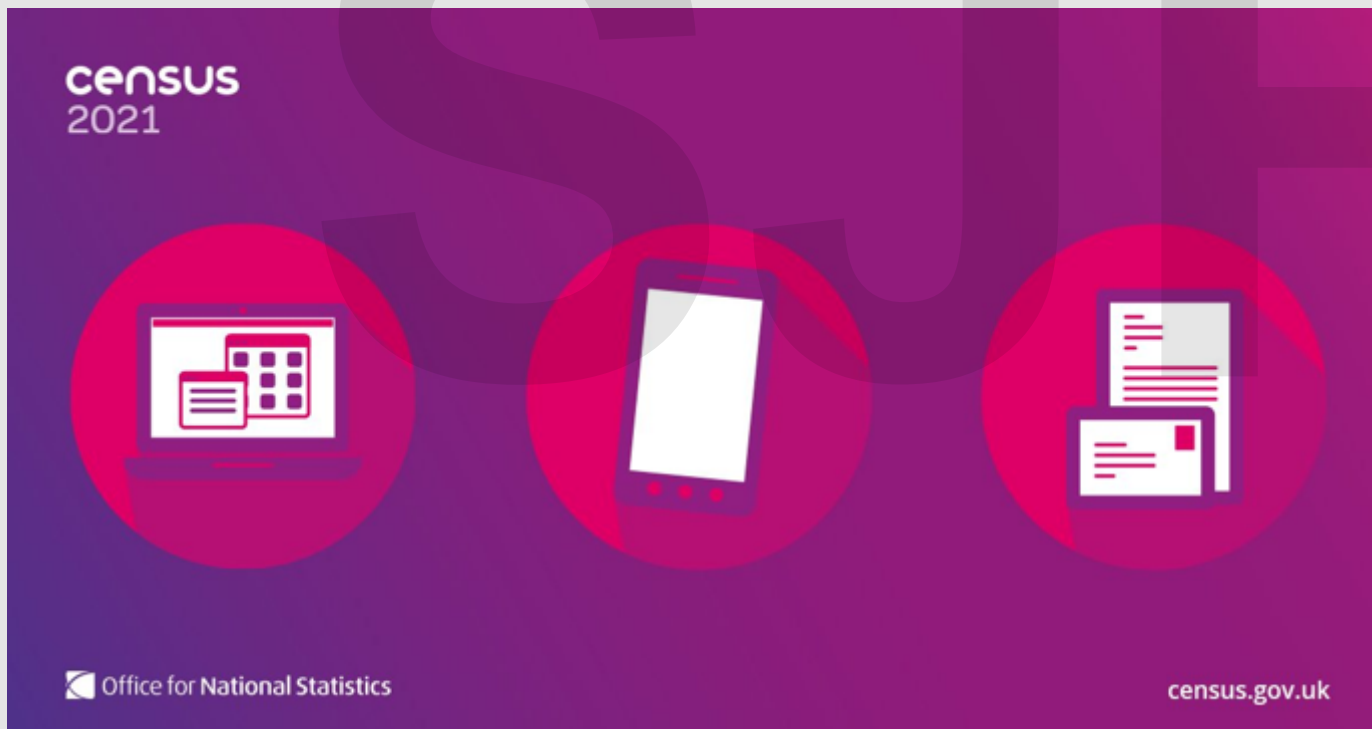

- What is a Census?
- The Census offers a picture of all the people and households in England and Wales. The first one was in 1801 and has been carried out every 10 years since then (with the exception of 1941 due to the Second World War).
- The Census is totally unique as there's simply nothing else that gives so much detail about us and the society we live in.
- All kinds of organisations, from local authorities to charities, use the information to help provide the services everyone needs, including transport, education and healthcare. Without the Census, it would be much more difficult to do this.

# Your future, your rights



Everyone in England and Wales must complete a census or be included on a census for the place where they're living or staying.

**!Warning:**

**You must complete the census by law**

Every householder at an address is responsible for completing a census questionnaire for their household. The householder should either answer the individual questions for all household members or make sure each member answers their own.

You could get fined £1000 if the census is not completed!

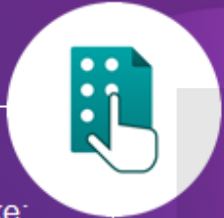

## Protecting your information

- Your census record is kept secure for 100 years.

# Rights and responsibilities

We're all guaranteed certain rights, and we have responsibilities as good citizens.

Our local community, organisations and government also have responsibilities to us.

## I have the right...

to receive good health care when I'm ill or injured.



## My community is responsible...

for providing enough hospital beds, doctors' surgeries, etc. so that everyone in the area can get the treatment they need.

## I am responsible...

for going to my appointments on time, not being a no-show, which means that others can also be seen on time, and taking medication only as prescribed.
