Missing school can seriously effect your academic progress.


At St Joseph's RC High School we believe that it is very important to attend school EVERY day unless you are ill.

Each day you are absent means that you have missed five lessons. Teachers do help pupils to catch up when they have been ill, but if you miss too many days there is a danger that you will fall behind with your work. It is so important that you attend school every day, also that you arrive in school on time. There is a clear and well evidenced link between good school attendance and achieving good results. If you miss school you may fall behind in work which may affect your future prospects.

Good school attendance also shows that you are reliable, you are more likely to achieve and will play a positive role in your community.

We celebrate good attendance with certificates which are awarded every term.

Please note: St Joseph's does 'not' authorise holidays or travelling to see relatives in term time. Such absence will result in a Fixed Penalty fine issued by Newport city

School Meals

The School has excellent on-site catering facilities whereby pupils can purchase breakfast before school (8.30am-8.50am*)

During mid-morning break:

An "Appetite for Life" compliant healthy eating menu is prepared and offered during term time by our catering partners Chartwells.

Every student is set up with an individual account. Money can be added to your child's account on-line via Schoolcomms (our on-line payment system). We do not accept cash payments.

Access to your child's account is via a biometric system (facial recognition). A letter will be sent to all parents/carers seeking agreement to participate and at the beginning of the academic year, the school will organise for an account to be set via facial recognition. Cameras are located at till points and recognize a child's facial image print and calls up their unique account.

Alternatively, you can visit the website www.schoolgateway.com and click on 'new user'. You will receive a text message with a PIN number to log into School Gateway. If you experience any trouble when logging in, please contact the school on 01633 653112 and we will update your details on SIMS. Details on downloading the app are also available via our school website.

Please note that the on-line payment option is also available for trips. The School will notify relevant parents/carers by text or email when school trips (including on-line consent for your child to take part in trips), are available for payment on Schoolcomms.

Please note that we are a healthy eating school and take food and fitness seriously. This is why we do not sell certain foods or drinks, such as chocolate, fizzy and energy drinks, fast food, crisps etc. We would ask parents who send their children to school with a packed lunch to be cognisant of our healthy eating aims. The canteen contains a facility for pupils to top up their water bottles during mid-morning break and lunch periods.



Your wellbeing...

Our number one priority when pupils come to St Joseph's is to ensure that they are safe and happy, by doing this we know that you will enjoy your time at school, be comfortable in your surroundings and be able to focus on being the best you can be. Two 'golden rules' that are easy to remember are always to be a nice person and try your best. We place a huge significance on kindness, respect, compassion, manners, and personal discipline and expect these qualities to be seen and heard every day.

We also want you to take some risks in your learning by coming out of your comfort zone, express your ideas and emotions in a confident yet controlled manner, develop and maintain healthy relationships with other pupils and staff, and take on different roles and responsibilities within your year group or across the whole school.

Some really important areas of your wellbeing that we will support you with and focus on are, physical health and development, mental health, and emotional and social well-being. We will guide you in understanding how these different areas of health and well-being are connected and appreciate how important good health and well-being are in your personal development, learning and being a happy person.

A letter to Year 6 from Zoe Uveges, 7T

Dear future Year 7's,

I would like to take this opportunity to welcome you all to this new school! I'm Zoe, one of the current Year 7 students here at St Josephs, I would like you to understand that there is nothing to worry about moving to Year 7. Last year I was in the exact same position as you are right now, but as you can see, I am very grateful about it. I am happy and I enjoy school very much, and I hope you will too! To make you more comfortable throughout your journey to high school, I have included some tips, advice and information that may be useful to you:

Classrooms: At first, I was very confused and scared that I would get lost, but after a few weeks, I got used to it. Remember that there are always people there to help you! On the ground floor (G), you will find Drama, RE, Music, Admin, the Hall, the Sportshall, Technology, the Canteen, Science and the Gym. On the first floor (F) will be the Sociology and Criminology, History and Geography, Inclusion, the Uniform Shop, English, Maths, Art and Media Studies rooms. On the second floor (S) we have the library and all the language classrooms, for example, Spanish, French and Cymraeg. There is a one-way-system that we use to stay safe and not get the staircases too crowded. There are silly older students who break the one-way-system, but don't listen or copy them. Outside (0), we also have the Computer Science rooms. There are a lot of things to remember, but trust me, you'll understand this all in

Forms: When I was starting Year 7, I was always thinking about classmates and what they will be like, but also all of my other friends. A form is like a class (like in Year 6) and you will do most of your lessons together. There are eight forms in each year - JOSEPHTV - JOSE and PHTV are split. Some lessons you will do together, but some you will not. For example, JOSE will have maths and games together, and PHTV will do maths and games together. JO will have technology lessons together, and so will SE, etc. You will be in the same form until Year 11 (unless you switch

forms for a reason). You will also have a Form Tutor, which is like your main teacher and go to adult. Their job is to answer any of your questions and help you with anything! You get the idea right? Every form has an AM REG and a PM REG. Your form is a great idea in my opinion, as you get to make new friends for a lifetime!

Equipment; When packing your school bag, things you MUST include are your pencil case (which we will discuss in a moment), PE kit (if you have pE or Games that day), a water bottle, books, lunch (unless you buy food from the canteen) and your phone if you wish, but you can only use this in the yard at lunchtime. I also tend to bring some extra essentials such as deodorant and a hair brush just in case. Must haves in your pencil case are a black or blue pen, a pencil, ruler, calculator, purple pen, rubber, sharpener, some highlighters and colored pencils. Top tip: I would always recommend bringing spares because, you never know, your pen might run out! Your bag must be black, navy or dark grey, and so does your coat when ith is cold.

I hope the information that I have provided has been helpful to you. I wish the best of luck for you at St Joseph's RC High School and I hope you will enjoy yourselves! I promise that you will not need to worry about anything! I guarantee you will regret worrying after a few weeks at high school. 

School books

Take pride in your books

When you start school you will be provided with an exercise book. When the book is full, your teacher will replace it free of charge. If you lose your book, you will be expected to replace it AND copy up all the work too.

Exercise books are very important pieces of equipment. All you need to write on the front cover is:

Your name

Your form

The name of the subject

The name of the subject teacher

YOU SHOULD NOT WRITE ANYTHING ELSE ON THE INSIDE OR THE OUTSIDE COVERS OF THE BOOK.

Titles will need to be underlined by using a ruler.

Pupils need to write in black ink, so make sure you have plenty of black pens.

Your books are a reflection of who you are and how seriously you invest time and effort into your learning.

Make sure you give your books a bit of love and attention!

As well as your parents/carers, there will be a variety of people who will be looking at your books to support your learning and celebrate the progress you make.

Classroom teachers will mark books regularly and check the information you write down every lesson. Your Form Tutors and Head of Year will do occasional 'book looks' and senior staff will take a selection of pupils' work at different times of the year to monitor department work.



How to set out your work

The presentation of your work is very important.

Why?

- Good presentation makes a good impression on the reader who will want to read what is written.
- Good presentation shows that you have taken care over your work and you have pride in your work

Some advice on presentation of your work:

- Always use a black pen when writing in your exercise book.
- Always include the headings <u>Gwaith Dosbarth</u> or <u>Gwaith Cartref</u> and the date and UNDERLINE them with a ruler. (In some subjects like French and Spanish you might be asked to write the headings in the language you are learning).
- Always include a <u>Title</u> for the piece of work set and UNDERLINE it with a ruler.

- Always make sure that what you have written makes sense by including the correct punctuation and grammar.
- Always remember that you are an important individual and that your written work should reflect the best of you.
- Using correct grammar and punctuation is very important.
- Make a special effort to learn how to paragraph and punctuate your work correctly.
- Check that you can use full stops, commas, question marks, exclamation marks and apostrophes confidently.
- Ask your teachers for help.
- Literacy is a very important part of our curriculum and every teacher will be keen to help. Literacy is not just taught in the English Department it is a whole school topic.
- When teachers return marked work, read comments carefully. You will receive next step advice and quidance.



At the beginning of Year 7 you will be given a Student Planner. It is a very important booklet and MUST be brought to school every day.

Your planner will have 'Traffic Light' cards in it so that you can show teachers how happy and confident you are with the tasks or topics.

Red

I need help please! I'm not sure about this task and would like some of the information repeated. Can you spend a little more time with me please?

Amber

I think I'm okay, I am going to have a try but I might need a learning partner or ask my teacher after attempting the task.

Green

I'm great! I understand - no help needed; I am able to work independently.

Homework

Homework is NOT optional and is given in most subjects each week...

What might you be asked to do for homework?

- Complete any class work which was unfinished in the lesson
- Learn work to prepare for a test
- Research work might be set, using the Library in school or the library in town. Research work means that your teacher will ask you to find out certain information about a certain topic and present your findings in an attractive way.
- Extension tasks for added challenge.

Here is some advice about homework:

- You need to plan your homework:
- * Write down your homework during the lesson and be sure of when the work has to be handed in
- * Check with your teacher that you know exactly what you have to do.
- * Make sure that you give enough time for each subject by deciding when the first deadlines have to be met and whether to do the easiest work first or to make a start on the difficult homework.
- Try to avoid the following whilst doing your homework:
- * Eating meals
- * Having the television on
- * Sitting in a noisy room
- * Being distracted by mobiles and social networking

- Ask your parents/carers to look at your homework when you have finished and ask them to sign your book if they are happy with the work.
- Check your timetable for the next day and pack your bag before going to bed.
- If you have been ill then naturally teachers will
 understand, but out of politeness, it would be a good
 idea to bring a note from your parents/carers to explain
 this. The teachers will then arrange for you to do the
 work you have missed.
- If you claim to have forgotten your book, most teachers will accept this excuse once. If it happens again, perhaps there is a more serious problem and your Head of Year may be contacted.
- If you do not complete your homework and do not have a good excuse you will find yourself given a sanction.

Homework is another chance to make sure you understood what occurred during lessons. Homework allows you to re-think and review.

Information for parents

Assessment / Recording / Reporting

Parent/Carers will receive three progress reports each academic year. When they receive these reports they are most welcome to contact the school to discuss it further with the relevant teacher or department.

At any time during the school year parents/carers are able to contact the Form Tutor or Head of Year if they have any queries regarding progress.

It is important that pupils frequently ask the questions:

How am I doing?

What do I need to do to improve?

Please encourage and help them to do so. Teachers are here to help your child achieve his/her very best!

In addition to these reports there will be two parents' evenings during the first year.

Autumn Term

At St Joseph's we expect to see every student represented at Parents' evening. If, for any reason, the student's parents/carers are unable to attend, grandparents or other older relatives are most welcome. They will be invited in to speak to Form Tutors and Senior Staff. The purpose of this meeting is to provide feedback on how pupils have settled into St Joseph's and to advise parents/carers on how they can help their children.

Summer Term

For most families the arrangements of getting to and from school are the most worrying and is the one issue you may have the most questions about.

St Joseph's works very closely with our current transport partners (appointed by NCC) Newport Transport, Monmouth Travel and Phil Anslow who will be issuing your bus pass and will be responsible for your journey.

NOTE: you will only be allowed to travel for free on your bus route by producing your actual plastic pass - you are only permitted to travel on the service clearly marked on your pass e.g. SJ1. Students with an SJ1 pass can travel on other services e.g. SJ2, SJ3 etc. but would be required to pay. Please inform your child that they will not be allowed free travel if they have photographs of the pass on their phones. It MUST be the actual pass.

For information on applying for a free bus pass (subject to qualifying), please contact your Local Authority, arranging bus passes is an agreement between families and your travel provider.

We have highlighted some simple rules to follow to ensure your journeys are safe and hassle free. Further information and a code of practice will be included in your Student Planner when school starts in September.

Please do not lose your bus pass as it will cost you a considerable amount of money to replace!

Bus rules...

- Always arrive at the bus stop on time and make sure you have your bus pass/money with you.
- Do not play about near the road while waiting for the bus. Wait on the pavement, well back from the road.
- Do not go near the bus and in particular, the wheels, until it has stopped.
- Do not push or rush for the door when the bus has stopped. Never operate the bus doors (except in an emergency).
- You should listen to the driver, do as he or she says with regard to the transport arrangements.
- Do not play games or throw objects on or from the bus, as this is dangerous and could cause an accident. Do not distract the driver and only use the emergency door IN CASE OF EMERGENCY.
- Once the vehicle has commenced its journey you must stay in your seat at all times.
- You must always wear a seatbelt if one is provided.
- Do not try to get on or off the bus until it has stopped.
- Take care that your coat or bag is not caught in the door when boarding or alighting.
- Having left your vehicle you should not return to it for safety reasons.
- Do not cross the road close behind or in front of the bus. You must be able to see clearly both ways. Where possible, use a pedestrian crossing.
- Older pupils should remember your actions may influence younger children.
- Please remember that in the event of persistent misbehaviour you may be excluded from using school transport. Serious incidents of misbehaviour or vandalism will be reported to the police.
- Make sure you have all your belongings as you leave the vehicle. If you have forgotten something, you must telephone the bus company.

| What is the food like? | "In my opinion, it's cool! There's multiple options to pick from everyday but the only downfall is that you normally have to wait in a very long line and it takes forever to get to your food. Lunch time in high school is only 40 minutes so you really don't have that much time but other than that the food they make is delicious and there's many options to choose from and the desert is impeccable!" |
| How many lessons do you have? | "You have five lessons a day each lasting one hour. Your lessons can be double lessons or just normal single lessons. 



By the end of Year 7 you will have completed a wide range of activities to improve your Reading, Writing and Oracy skills. Your learning will be based around the themes of identity, courage and respect. You will study a novel, great speeches, Shakespeare, poetry and non-fiction texts.

What about when you first start?

Your first few weeks in English will help you to build on the skills you have already gained in primary school with a focus on grammar and literacy skills. This will give us an invaluable opportunity to enable you to reach your full potential in the subject.

How will you build on Literacy skills??

In every English lesson, you will take part in dedicated independent reading time where you will be able to read a book of your choice from our very well stocked library! Not sure what you want to read? No problem! Our fantastic Librarian can help you find a novel you will love.

What do we expect of you?

- That you follow all of the school's behaviour rules.
- That you attempt every task set and try your best when completing it.
- That you join in during lessons, particularly during pair, group and whole class discussions.
- That you complete all homework set by the deadline and to the highest standard possible

How will you be assessed?

Each term you will complete Reading, Writing and Speaking and Listening assessments. Your teacher will spend a lot of time in class preparing you for your assessments. This assessment will show what progress has been made. As well as assessments, your teacher will regularly mark your exercise books and provide you with targets to improve your work. Your assessments and exercise books will be marked according to the school marking policy, which will be shown and explained to you when you arrive at St Joseph's, along with the school presentation rules.

What else can you expect?

- You may be involved in school trips to the theatre or research trips.
- Your English teacher will regularly book Chromebooks for you to use during English lessons.
- The opportunity to enter a variety of out-of-school and in-school competitions with lots of exciting prizes for the winners!

Mathematics

The work in your Mathematics lessons should be a natural follow-on from your work in primary school, where you have been following the bridging units.

- You will study topics from:
 - Number and Algebra
 - * Shape and Space
 - Data Handling
 - * Functional Skills and Investigative Maths
- By the end of the year we would hope that your mental arithmetic skills will be further developed, and that your confidence with maths has increased.
- It will be a big help if you know your tables, but some time will be given over to their practice.
- You will be 'set' into a certain group for maths based on your ability, and information from your primary school. You will be assessed regularly and you can move up a set if you work hard and make the necessary improvement.

- Homework will be set at least once a week and will help you practice skills you have been taught and identify if you have any difficulties. You must remember to complete your homework on time.
- To help you reflect on new work as you go along, there will be regular assessments as well as an end of year exam.
- We want you to get involved in your lessons as much as you can and to enjoy learning maths. As in your current school we make a lot of use of mini whiteboards so that you can show us what you know.
- You will need a pen, pencil, ruler, eraser and calculator for all lessons.
- You will have your own unique password and login to access Google Classroom to complete homework, revise and play mathematics games.

Science

In science you will learn about a series of scientific ideas through a practically based course. The modules will provide you with the answers to many questions about how the world works.

After an introductory module about how to be safe in a science laboratory, you will learn about:

- Cells the building blocks of life. How cells work together to form tissues and organs.
- States of matter matter can be either solids, liquids or gases.
- Forces the different types of forces and what they do.
 How are they useful and what problems do they cause.
- Human reproduction male and female anatomy, how a baby is farmed and develops.
- **pH** acids and alkalis. How strong they are, how we measure the strength. Use of acids and alkalis.
- Space the arrangement of the planets in our solar system. Stars, meteors and asteroids, what are they and what do they do?

Each module will where appropriate contain experimental investigations, where you will learn how to plan methods and record results to answer a problem. Your progress will be monitored regularly, so that you can watch your levels progress. At the end of each topic there will be end of topics tests.

There will be opportunities for students to produce work electronically on google classroom.

Computer Science



At St Joseph's, Computer Science is an essential and forward-looking subject that equips students with the knowledge, creativity and critical thinking skills required in the modern digital world. Students will engage in a diverse and ambitious curriculum that balances theoretical understanding with practical application.

Computational Thinking

Students will be encouraged to apply the concepts of computational thinking throughout lessons at St Josephs - a core foundation of problem solving in Computer Science. They learn to:

- Decompose complex problems into manageable parts.
- Recognise patterns and relationships.
- Develop step-by-step algorithms.
- Apply abstraction to focus on essential information.

These strategies are transferable across all subject areas and nurture a methodical and logical approach to challenges.

Cryptology and Codebreaking

An introduction to the principles of cryptology allows students to explore the history and mathematics behind secure communication. They will examine classical ciphers, encryption methods, and logic puzzles, gaining insight into how data can be protected in an increasingly digital society.

Programming and Software Development

Students progress through a structured programming pathway:

- Scratch: A visual language to build foundational logic and event-driven thinking.
- Python: A powerful text-based language used widely in industry and education.
- HTML: The core language of the web, enabling students to create and structure their own websites.

Through engaging projects, students gain confidence in designing, writing, and debugging their own code.

Digital Graphic Design

Students explore the principles of digital design, developing their understanding of concepts such as:

- · Abstract and conceptual design.
- Symmetry, balance, and visual hierarchy.
- Effective use of white space and colour theory.
- The rule of thirds and layout composition.

These skills support both creative expression and professional communication in digital media.

Cyber Security and Digital Responsibility

As a CyberFirst Gold school, this is a topic we are very passionate about. They examine:

- Types of cyber threats and how they operate.
- Strategies to protect personal and organisational data.
- Ethical and legal responsibilities in the digital age.
- Motivations behind cybercrime and the role of legislation.

The curriculum promotes responsible digital citizenship and awareness of online safety.

Machine Learning and the Ethics of Al

As emerging technologies shape the future, students are encouraged to think critically about Artificial Intelligence. Topics include:

- How machines are trained to recognise patterns and make decisions.
- The ethical implications of bias in Al systems.
- The responsibilities of developers, users, and governments in Al deployment.
- The impact of automation on society and employment.
- These discussions nurture digital literacy and ethical reflection.

Data Literacy and Information Systems

Students are introduced to the role of data in society. They explore how information is collected, analysed, interpreted, and used to make evidence-based decisions - an essential skill for the data-driven world.

Preparing for a Digital Future

Our programme fosters resilient learners who are not only digitally skilled but also critical thinkers and responsible digital citizens. Computer Science is more than just a subject - it's a pathway to shaping the world around you.



Cymraeg

Before starting at St Joseph's, you should be able to:

By the end of Year 7 you will be able to:

- Build upon previous knowledge learnt from Primary School.

- Recognise and know how to create tenses in Cymraeg.
- Learn the difference between the soft and nasal mutations.
- Learn about Hedd Wyn, Myrddin ap Dafydd and the importance of the Eisteddfod.
- Discuss and describe yourself and a famous Cymru person in Cymraeg.

By the end of Year 7, you will also have had the opportunity to:

- Use digital technology to complete research and language quizzes.
- Have practised the skills of oracy, reading and writing in Cymraeg. You will be able to take part in group conversations based on the topics you have learned
- Complete longer tests from time to time. These will be based on the work you have done in class and could be closed or open book activities.

Geography

Geography is everywhere – without it you are lost. It helps you to understand the complex and dynamic world in which you live. In Geography, we aim to help students to develop an understanding of their global responsibility and interdependence as well as encourage them to develop their own opinions and attitudes.

What will pupils learn?

In Year 7 we study four topics:

Geographical Skills

Pupils' knowledge of continents and oceans is consolidated before introducing key map skills for them practice. The unit is then finished off with a local scale introduction to Duffryn/ Newport.

Development

Pupils gain knowledge in classifying countries before determining why there is uneven development around the world. They then use this new knowledge to apply it to Tanzania to investigate whether this country can become a HIC over time.

Rivers and Flooding

By the end of this topic pupils will have learned how the water cycle operates. They will also have learned how specific processes result in distinctive landforms along the river's course. They will have investigated contributing factors of flooding as well as effects and responses of flooding in the context of Bangladesh.

<u>Fieldwork</u>

Pupils are introduced to fieldwork for the first time and their first opportunity to test theory out in the field. In this unit, pupils revisit the concept of flooding and how different land-use influences flood risk. They will then apply this knowledge to look at flood risk across the school site by completing an infiltration experiment.

How will pupils be assessed?

- In Year 7 pupils will be given one half hour homework per week.
- They will complete 3 assessed pieces of work in each unit that will be used to determine the progress they are making within Geography.

They will also sit an examination at the end of the year that will cover topics they've learnt through Y7 Geography

Geography teaches valuable skills, so by the end of Year 7 pupils will be able to:

- Understand and apply all the basic map skills (4 & 6 figure grid references, use direction/scale) Being able to interpret maps and graphs showing different statistical information.
- Carry out field work.
- Work independently and develop empathy for other communities around the world.
- Develop their ability to explain and provide evaluation in their writing.



History

In Year 7 pupils will be taught history in two lessons over a fortnight which will be delivered by one teacher.

What will we learn in History?

- How did Britain change after the Norman Conquest?
- By the end of the autumn term you will have learned about:
- What is history? You will learn all about the skills of history.
- The Norman invasion.
- The Norman Conquests of England and Cymru.

Why was the Church so important?

By the end of the spring term you will have learned about:

- · Why the Church was so important in the Middle Ages?
- King John.
- The causes and results of the Black Death.

Life in a medieval village in Cymru.

By the end of the summer term you will have learned about:

- The lives of the rich and poor in the medieval period.
- Crime and punishment in medieval villages.
- Cosmeston village.


History teaches valuable skills, so by the end of Year 7 you will be able to:

- Use historical evidence.
- Know the difference between cause and consequence.
- Know the difference between fact and opinion.
- Carry out independent research.
- · Work in a team to complete tasks.

How will you be assessed?

At the end of each unit you will sit an assessment in which you will be given a National Curriculum level. You will also sit an examination at the end of the year that will cover topics from across the year.





International Languages

We are looking forward to welcoming you in the International Languages department. The aim of learning languages is to help you communicate throughout the world.

During Year 7 you will learn and develop French speaking, listening, reading and writing skills. For us learning a new language should be fun and interactive, lessons incorporate a variety of tasks and we make regular use of ICT. We will help you make links to Cymraeg and other languages you may speak - languages connect us.

By the end of the year you will be able to:

- Introduce yourself to others.
- Talk about your likes and dislikes relating to food and hobbies.
- Use French grammar and sentences successfully; present tense regular verbs, opinions and reasons and use adjectives.
- Developing writing skills to include spontaneous writing up to 60 words.

How You Will be assessed in French?

Using self/peer assessment. Live marking in the classroom - listen to teacher's feedback. Key tasks - you will be given success criteria and feedback based on this to help you improve and move forward.

Homework is set weekly and will involve a variety of tasks such as writing and reading, research and learning new vocabulary.

We endeavour to organise trips to France for students in Year 8, it is a fabulous few days and the students have always really enjoyed using their French in genuine situations.

If you are really good and produce very good work you will be awarded a worthy of praise and be provided with opportunities to extend your skills through additional workshop sessions.




